Project spotlight

Raising children in a world affected by climate change

Dr Carolina Gonzalez is leading the research project Understanding parenting in times of climate change, in collaboration with Professor Alina Morawska (UQ) and Dr Carla Jeffries (University of Southern Queensland, UniSQ). This project was funded by a 2023 UniSQ Capacity Building Grant. As parents play a key role in shaping their children's care for the environment, this project aims to understand parents' pro-environmental attitudes and behaviours when raising their children in an environmentally friendly way in Australia.

The first study of this project is a scoping review that has identified an inconsistency of terms and definitions used in the literature when exploring how parents promote their children's pro-environmental behaviours. There is also limited use of theories and appropriate adaptation and development in the context of pro-environmental attitudes and behaviours of families.

Almost 400 parents across Australia have completed a survey about what parents think and do towards the environment and associated psychosocial factors. In addition, more than 20 parents across Australia have participated in semi-structured interviews, and provided their insights about parenting, climate change, pro-environmental attitudes and behaviours and their hopes for the future.

Bullying in schools
